1 Cree Justice Symposium News – Thursday, January 29, 2009

RE-CAP OF DAY TWO

Stacy Bear, Chief of the Cree Nation Youth Council, discussed the needs of youth of the Cree Nation and the work of the Cree Nation Youth Council. She concluded her speech with a summary of the results of the Cree Youth Survey, the results of which were distributed to the entire delegation.

Doris Bobbish, Director of the Cree Women of Eeyou Istchee Association, made a heartfelt speech on the issues surrounding violence against women and children. Ms. Bobbish offered resolutions to stop violence and declare a month dedicated to raising awareness in respect to the issues of family violence

Donald Nicholls, Acting Director of Justice/Corrections, Cree Regional Authority, presented highlights from the Cree Adult Survey, which received 352 responses from across the Cree Nation.

Our lunch time speakers were **John Henry Wapachee** and **Andrew Neeposh** from the CRA's Recreation Department. They discussed the work of the Recreation Department and the essential role sports and recreation plays in engaging youth and keeping them away from trouble. Mr. Wapachee and Mr. Neeposh also highlighted the need for enhanced funding to develop and implement a broader selection of programs for all Cree people.

Next, Deputy Grand Chief **Ashley Iserhoff** provided a progress update on the regionalized police service and made mention of each community's police commissioner. He also discussed the role of policing and the need for all community members to support the work of the police to ensure safe and healthy communities for all.

COMMUNITY PRESENTATIONS

Five communities – Chisasibi, Ouje-Bougoumou, Whapmagoostui, Washaw Sibi and Wemindji – presented their key justice issues. Summaries of their presentations are available from Ms. Judy Cooper or Ms. Rita Blackned. Today, the remainder of the communities will be asked to make their presentations.
